THE FAITH OF THOMAS AND THE REST OF US



Dear Easter People,

An important figure in today's gospel passage is the Apostle called **Thomas**. He has lots of lessons to teach us. He did not believe them when they told him the Lord had risen and appeared to them. He needed evidence; not his face, not his voice, not his clothes, all he needed was to see and touch the wounds. Jesus came back the next Sunday. When Thomas saw the wounds, the sight was enough for

him to believe. How powerful those wounds of Jesus. I would have advised him to have them cleaned them up so as not to traumatize the disciples. I would have advised him to have healed himself of those wounds since he had the power to rise from the dead, at least so that his enemies would not laugh at him. But he knew better, he knew that the wounds would serve as testimony that he came, he saw, and he conquered. He knew that it was by the wounds that his disciples would recognize him, and so he kept them. There is power in the scars. They tell the story of a Shepherd, who laid down his life for his sheep, the Lord who loved unto death.

There are things about our past we wish never happened. There are mistakes we made in the past we wish to erase from our memories. Some of us are ashamed to talk about our family of origin. We don't want people to know the name of the school we attended. But we are who we are today either because of our backgrounds or in spite of our backgrounds.

Dear friends of Jesus, what scars are you carrying today? What forms of betrayal have you experienced? What persecutions have you endured for his sake? What weaknesses are you battling against? Don't be in a haste to wipe out your past. All that happened to you happened for a reason. After his resurrection, the apostles recognized him as the Lord by his wounds; **Thomas recognized him as God by his wounds**. On the last day, when we appear before him, we will recognize him when he shows us his wounds. He may also ask you on that day, "Who are you?" What marks will you show him as a sign that you fought a good fight and conquered? What scars will you show him as evidence of your discipleship? Scripture says, **"By his wounds we are healed" (Isaiah 53:5)**. May our wounds be united with the wounds of Jesus Christ to bring us healing in this life.


A further lesson from Thomas was the big mistake that he made by cutting himself off from the community when the crisis came. Some of us still make the same mistake today. The consequences were alienation, doubt and grief. In his doubt and grief, Thomas worked alone and outside the community of believers. He was thoroughly wounded and in need of healing. It was only when he re-joined the community that he encountered the risen Lord. It is then that he found his faith and his wounds were healed. When Thomas was told that Jesus had risen he said unless I see the wounds the nails have made and unless I touch his side I refuse to believe. When he re-joined the group, Jesus once again appeared to them and he turned to Thomas and said, Thomas put your finger here, look, here are my hands, doubt no longer but believe and Thomas exclaimed *"My Lord and My God."* Jesus responded *"you believe because you can see me, happy are those who have not seen and yet believed" (John 20:29)*.

Thomas' demand sounds reasonable and logical but while being guided by reason we must also listen to our hearts. We must pay attention to our imaginations and give room for insights from deep within us. There are layers and dimensions of reality which elude physical senses but which are nevertheless real. At the encounter with the risen Lord, Thomas soon discovered the foolishness of the conditions that he laid out. He discovered that he could not impose his own limited categories on God. He had lost one whole week joyful life in his doubts, grief and isolation. On meeting Jesus, he cried out in worship "My Lord and My God." **Thomas' cry of faith became the most powerful proclamation of the identity of Christ**. In one instant, he moved from earthly scene to spiritual believing. The resurrection of Jesus was reassuring for the weak, frightened and disillusioned disciples. When Thomas finally met Jesus, his own fears vanished; his doubts disappeared. He was healed of his blindness. A new fire was lit within him and he was immediately energised to go on and spread the good news. Yes on meeting Jesus Thomas suddenly recognised his need to be filled by **the surprising ways of God** rather than insist that God meets his own conditions. That is why he made that powerful act of faith.

Like the doubting Thomas, many of us are often not there when Jesus comes. But we all need to be part of the communities where our faiths will blossom, where our hopes will be sustained and where our love will grow. We need communities of shared faiths and possessions, of shared fortunes and misfortunes and of shared joys and sorrows. Like Thomas, many of us insist that God must behave only in ways that fit our own expectations. We often refuse to go deeper to savour the mysterious ways of God. So like Thomas, many of us often lose our joy and peace and live most of our lives in loneliness, doubt and despair.

Faith is the basis of the Christian life. Believing defines the Christian as service defines the servant. Faith according to letter to the Hebrews "...is the assurance of blessings hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). Faith is waiting on God knowing that he is trustworthy and reliable. Faith is openness to the God who does the impossible. By faith a virgin conceived the only begotten son of God. By faith the crucified one

came back to life. By faith the early Christians were transformed from frightened disciples into bold and courageous martyrs of the faith and they went far beyond where their human capabilities could not carry them. By faith, the mighty could be pulled down and the lowly raised. By faith five loaves can be multiplied to feed five thousand. By faith desperate situations could be overturned and dead ends opened. By faith good will overcome evil and love overcome hate. By faith the stone can be rolled away and sinners can rise from the ashes of shame to newness of life. Faith takes us where our senses cannot go. Faith enables us to see beyond physical sights. The apostles had the privilege of seeing Jesus physically, but they have no significant advantage over those who know Jesus through believing. Letter to the Hebrews assures us again: "... without faith it is impossible to please God" (Heb 11:6).
