
THE TRIPOD STAND OF OUR FAITH JOURNEY

God's Good People,

Georg Wilhelm Friedrich Hegel was a German philosopher who developed a dialectical scheme that emphasized the progress of history and of ideas from thesis to antithesis and thence to a synthesis. The triad is usually described in the following way: The thesis is an intellectual proposition. The antithesis is simply the negation of the thesis, a reaction to the proposition. The synthesis solves the conflict between the thesis and antithesis by reconciling their common truths and forming a new proposition. Hegel taught that in human history, when the status quo (the thesis) is challenged by a new historical development or force (the antithesis), a new form of life emerges out of the synthesis of the two prior stages. All four of the gospels emphasise the fact that the tomb where the body of Jesus was laid was empty on Easter Sunday morning. In today's gospel we have Luke's account of the risen Lord appearing to the disciples. Luke doesn't tell us who is present on this occasion, but presumably it is a large group of disciples, men and women. They are terrified and startled. The disciples are wondering if this a hallucination, a mirage or a ghost? But the Lord assures them: "Look at my hands and feet; yes, it is I indeed. Touch me and see for yourselves; a ghost has no flesh and bones as you can see I have." The risen Lord is the same person whom they knew before. And then he asks them, "Have you anything here to eat?" Although the body of the risen Lord could appear and disappear at will, it was still a physical body, able to eat baked fish. Jesus is not a disembodied spirit; he has a real body of flesh, bones and blood. Christianity, therefore, is founded on an event with a unique promise. Jesus defeated death by dying and rising again, physically rising from the dead. This One Man brought back with him from the realm of the dead the hope and the certainty of eternal life for all.

Two disciples, Cleopas and his companion, encountered the risen Lord as they were returning home to Emmaus from Jerusalem. They rush back to Jerusalem to tell the other disciples about their experience when suddenly the risen Lord appears in their midst. Luke's account of the risen Lord's appearance, firstly to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, and then to the disciples in Jerusalem is an example of one of the inescapable rhythms of human life. Just like Georg Hegel's philosophical triad which goes from thesis to synthesis, the rhythm that we speak of here begins with enchantment. Which is followed by disenchantment. Which in turn is followed by re-enchantment. Consider this example: You're attracted to another person and a promising marital relationship begins. But it's not long before disenchantment rears its head. The more intimately that you come to know that other person, the more aware you are of the things about them that annoy or irritate you. At this stage you may decide to end the relationship, or you could admit that neither of you, is perfect. And you take each other for better and for worse. That is re-enchantment.

Luke's account of the risen Lord's appearance to the also а story of enchantment, disenchantment and re-enchantment. Keep in mind that the Lord appears in today's gospel while the two disciples who had encountered the Lord on the road to Emmaus were telling their story to the other disciples. Following the crucifixion of Jesus these two disciples were returning home to Emmaus when a stranger joins them. They would have assumed that the feast of Passover in Jerusalem. We, of course,



know that this stranger is Jesus himself, but neither of the disciples recognises him. He asks, "What are you discussing as you walk along?" Cleopas replies, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know what has been happening there these last few days?" The irony is, of course, that Jesus is the only one who truly does know what has just happened in Jerusalem. Cleopas then says: "We had hoped that he was the one to set Israel free." This is the stage of enchantment. When Jesus enters Jerusalem the people acclaim him: "Hosanna! Blessed is he who is coming in the name of the Lord, the King of Israel." Despite the fact that he comes riding a donkey, the people are hoping that as Messiah Jesus will restore the fortunes of Israel. This is their point of enchantment. But on Friday of that week Jesus is crucified. Every single disciple knew what that meant: we backed the wrong horse. The game is over. For the disciples this is disenchantment. This is not how they expected things to turn out. But the resurrection of Jesus Christ will bring them back to re-enchantment.

Let's return to the two disenchanted disciples returning home to Emmaus. The mysterious stranger who has joined them, whom they still don't recognise, begins to lead them from disenchantment to re-enchantment: "How foolish you are! So slow to believe all that the prophets said! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer and so enter into his glory?" (Lk 24:25ff). Luke then tells us: "Then, starting from Moses and from all the prophets, he explained to them the passages about himself throughout the scriptures." (cf Lk 24:27) The process of re-enchantment reaches its climax once they reach Emmaus. Cleopas and his companion invite the stranger to join them, and as they sit at table Jesus takes bread, breaks it and hands it to them. And their eyes are opened. In those few words we have one of the keys to re-enchantment - their eyes are opened. They had become disenchanted because they were looking for the wrong kind of messiah. Jesus is alive again and because he is alive, we are alive too. Yes, in our tripod journey of faith, we move from enchantment to disenchanted, whenever we begin to look for the wrong messiah. Reenchantment only occurs when we allow our eyes to be opened.
