

First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion Preparation. Parents are encouraged to take an active part in their children's preparation by going over the work done in the preparation classes and also helping their children with the relevant activities in their workbooks. Our parish webpage has a section for <u>Sacramental Preparation</u> with the programme outline for easy reference. Lessons resume this Sunday. We will be covering Chapter 20: Making up for our offenses.

Prayer Partners for First Communion candidates. We have seventeen candidates this year and each of them has a card with their name on it. These can be found at the back of church. Parishioners are encouraged **to sign and pledge their prayerful support** for our young people during this time of their preparation for the Sacraments of First Reconciliation and First Communion (and Baptism for one of them). Support as many of the young people as you like with your prayers. These cards will be given to the candidates on the day of their First Communion as a reminder that they are part of our parish family and the parish will always be there to support and encourage them in their journey of faith. **Prayer** is one of the three pillars of Lent, so let us make it our mission this Lent to **pray for all the young people in our parish**, even though we may not always be able to see the effects of our prayers, it will make a difference in their lives.

GOD IS ALWAYS IN CONTROL

Dearly Beloved in Christ,

Today's readings brings to mind the age-long question of "Where is God when bad things happen to good people?" In the first reading, we have the story of the sacrifice of Abraham. Going through the story, one might be wondering why God should even contemplate not to talk of permitting such evil. Considering how long Abraham and Sarah waited to have a son, it sounds absolutely incredible to think of God as demanding for the life of the little boy, Isaac. Imagine how tensed-up one might be until the point of Abraham lifting his knife to cut the boy's throat. Someone might scream, "God! Where are you?" When you watch a replay of a football match that you have seen before, you would usually watch with very little or no tension in mind, reason being that you have seen it before. God, on His part (using human terms) would be on His rocking chair like someone watching a replay of a football match, on a Television screen, saying, "Relax, I have seen it before, I know how it ended, the boy will not be killed, a ram will be provided to take his place." Paul, in our second reading, reminds us clearly that God's love has no limits.



God has given the greatest gift of all to the world in the handing over of Jesus his beloved son. Can anyone doubt that God would not give every other lesser gift as well, including a ram for the Abrahamic sacrifice? Indeed, when compared to the gift God gives in Jesus, all else faints into insignificance. Nevertheless, Paul's words offer encouragement to believers, who may be burdened with worries, difficult times or other struggles inherent in the human experience. In a sense, Paul is saying, look at the bigger picture; gain some perspective and be at peace because God has seen it all and **He is in control**.

In the Gospel passage, we have the story of the **Transfiguration of Jesus**. This came as a preparation for the difficult days ahead. This came as a preview of what will come after the cross. When Jesus faced his agony at Gethsemane, he prayed for the cup to pass him by, but his Father must have assured him, "Relax, my Son, I have seen it before, I know how it ended, remember the preview at the Transfiguration." Then Jesus said, "...not my will, but your will be done." When he got to the cross, he felt abandoned by his Father and he cried out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" His Father must have reminded him of the preview from the Transfiguration and said, "Relax, I have seen it before, I know how it ended, after the cross comes the glory", then he commended his spirit into the hands of his Father. Indeed, we now know how the story ended.

My dearly beloved in Christ, as we enter the second week of Lent, I have no idea what your story has been like. Perhaps, you are a victim of constant persecution. Maybe the truth you stand for is winning you a lot of enemies. Maybe those in authority or those who are close to the corridors of power are using you to flex their muscles. Maybe you have been sincerely battling some temptations. Maybe your prayers seem to be falling on deaf ears. It is even possible that today is the ultimatum you have given to God. Maybe you have asked many times, "God, where are you? Why me? Why now?" Before you give up on God and yourself; before you submit to the philosophy of "If you can't beat them, join them", God is saying to you, "Relax, my child. I have seen it before. I know the end from the beginning. I have the final victory waiting for you at the end of the game, so do not run away before the game is over." Like He said to Jeremiah (cf. 1:5ff), He knew you before you were born and has made provisions for you to the end. Remember, sometimes God calms the storm, other times He lets the storm and calms His child. Looking at the second reading once again, St. Paul assures us that if God is for us, no one, nothing can be against us. In the midst of afflictions, God says to us, "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46: 10). The transfiguration was a joyful experience for the apostles who had followed Jesus right up to the mountain. We are invited today to do the same as individuals and as a worshipping community. We are being called through this biblical and historic event, to follow Jesus through our effective daily prayers and weekly celebration of the Holy Eucharistic event. The voice that called at the Transfiguration event was the voice of truth. Today the world yearns desperately for the voice of truth. There are countless conflicting voices competing for our attention today. One of such voices is the social media. The internet space is filled with all manner of weird ideas that sink people deeper into depression and forlornness. We need to shift attention to the voice of Jesus which is the only authentic voice of truth. Within this special season of Lent, let us strive to encounter Jesus at the high mountain like those three disciples, where we will hear his voice of truth and learn to follow him so that we "... may have life and have it to the full" (John 10:10).
