A LIGHT THAT ENLIGHTENS THE NATIONS

Beloved of the Lord,



We are now in the 4th week of our Lenten journey. Let's refresh our mind on the journey so far, following the footsteps of Jesus. On the 1st Sunday of Lent God's Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert where he was tested. Jesus overcame. On the 2nd Sunday of Lent Jesus, together with Peter, James and John, ascended a high mountain, and there he was transfigured. This was a very special occasion meant to reinforce the ailing faith of the Apostles. On the 3rd Sunday of Lent, Jesus entered the Temple precinct

and drove out those selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters. This act of cleansing of the temple was also meant to extend to the cleansing of our hearts and lives, to make us fitting dwelling places for God. On this 4th Sunday of Lent Jesus meets one of the Pharisees named Nicodemus and tells him that "The Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him." This 4th Sunday of Lent is traditionally known as Laetare Sunday, and it is one of two Sundays in the year on which the priest may wear rose-coloured vestments in place of the more sombre purple. The other Sunday is the 3rd Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday. The opening words to the entrance antiphon of today's Mass, Laetare Jerusalem - Rejoice Jerusalem - are summons to joy, anticipating the feast of Easter which is drawing near. In his book The Liturgical Year Adolf Adam tells us that the wearing of rose-coloured vestments was first mentioned in the sixteenth century and probably originated in the papal custom of blessing the "Golden Rose" on this day. This blessing was associated with a popular Roman custom, originating from at least the tenth century, which celebrated the victory of spring over winter by the wearing of flowers. From the eleventh century onwards, the Pope presented a costly, artificial rose (rather than a natural flower), firstly to his officials, and later to eminent people outside Rome. Let's return to the readings. The scholarly consensus is that Mark wrote the first of the four gospels sometime between 65 and 75 AD. But Mark begins his gospel with the adult ministry of Jesus. He tells us nothing about the birth or childhood of Jesus. The gospels of Matthew and Luke, written about twenty years later, both have infancy narratives. John's gospel from which today's periscope is drawn, was written at the end of the first century and it begins, not with an infancy narrative, but with a Prologue. The infancy narratives of Matthew and Luke, and the Prologue of John's gospel function in much the same way as an overture. Just as a musical overture anticipates themes or ideas from the opera or oratorio, the infancy narratives and prologue do precisely that in the gospel. They sound notes that will resonate throughout the scriptures, in a manner that anticipates the endpoint from the beginning. The Prologue of John's Gospel is the key for the interpretation of the entire gospel. Two outstanding notes from this Prologue are the imagery of darkness and light and the imagery of salvation.

In the season of Lent, even as we reflect on the suffering and death of Jesus, the Church prepares us for the resurrection. For example, two Sundays ago (2nd Sunday of Lent), with the reading on the Transfiguration, besides resuscitating the faith of the Apostles in Jesus, the Church was reminding us that the suffering and death of Jesus will lead to his resurrection and glorification. Today's Gospel passage focussing on the conversation between Jesus and Nicodemus, the Church prepares us for the resurrection by reminding us of the incarnation: **God became a human being that we may be reconciled to God through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ**.

In Jesus Christ, the light of God has been brought to us, but this requires a response from us if we are to have a share in the resurrection of Jesus. The birth, earthly ministry, passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ happened once upon a time in history. But his redemptive work is for the benefit of all human beings of every race and of every age. In order that we who were not at the foot of the cross when it happened in history, may have a full share in the fruit of his passion, death and resurrection, Jesus has given us the **Sacraments** as means of connecting us to the merits of what he did at a point in time. It is like any of the news media for instance, the signal from BBC is on air, but we need to get a television and tune to the right channel to partake of what is being sent from the studio.

Many times unfortunately, we are like the 98-year old lady who would not use her hearing aid because she thinks it is a nuisance to her. God has given us many hearing aids to enable us hear him, loud and clear, and connect to his grace, but we put them away because we think they make us uneasy. He has given us **conscience** as a kind of hearing aid; he has given us the **scripture** as his word; he has given us the **Church** and the **Sacraments**. But come to think of it, when we are faced with difficult decisions to make in life, do we not sometimes push aside these divinely prepared hearing aids because we feel they make us ill at ease? Do we not sometimes say that the Bible is outdated or that the Church is old fashioned?

God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world but that the world might be saved through him. The onus is now on us to bring ourselves to him to benefit from the merits of his salvific works. The season of Lent calls us to examine ourselves to see how we have been making the best of the hearing aids God has put in place for us. For the times we have failed, let us find consolation in the abundance of God's mercy, but then, what He simply asks of us is that we should acknowledge our weakness and our need of Him and let Him do His work in us. Let us once again return to John's Prologue: we read in the Prologue that "...the true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world." And "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness could not overpower it." (cf

John 1:4-5). But in today's gospel passage from chapter 3, we read that *"though the light has come into the world people have shown that they prefer darkness to the light because their deeds were evil."* (cf John 3:19). Friends in Christ, the choice is now yours. It is a choices between light and darkness.
