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

First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion Preparation. 

HIS LIFE GIVING DEATH

Dear God's Good People,

On the Sundays of Ordinary Time in the Church's liturgy, the first reading is usually chosen because, in one way or another, it complements the theme of the gospel. The second reading, habitually taken from one of the New Testament letters, is on a cycle of its own, and it is purely coincidental if it happens to reflect the same theme as the gospel and first reading. However, during Lent the lectionary arranges the readings topically or ideologically. In Year B, for instance, the first readings for Lent focus on the theme of covenant. The second readings are about the identity of Christ and our identity in Christ, while the gospel readings are on the theme of salvation.



Let's see how the first readings for each Sunday of Lent are on the theme of God's covenant with his people. On the **First Sunday of Lent** we had an account of the covenant that God entered into after the Flood. The covenant was made with Noah, with Noah's descendants, with all the living creatures that were in the ark, and finally, it was a covenant with the earth itself. The rainbow was to be a sign of this covenant. On the **Second Sunday of Lent** we had the story of the testing of Abraham, recorded in the book of Genesis. The name Abraham means "father of a multitude", but how will Abraham fulfil his destiny if he sacrifices his only son, Isaac? This is a test, and because Abraham obeys the voice of God he will be blessed, and God makes a covenant with him: "I will shower blessings on you, I will make your descendants as many as the

stars of heaven and the grains of sand on the seashore" (Gen 22:17). On the Third Sunday of Lent we heard the account of God giving the Law to Moses. The Ten Commandments include the basic conditions for covenant membership. Last Sunday's (Fourth Sunday of Lent) first reading from the second book of Chronicles told the story of the destruction of the temple by the Babylonians, and the exile of the people by the rivers of Babylon. But the reading ends on a note of hope. God rouses Cyrus, the pagan Persian king who had conquered the Babylonians, to order the rebuilding of the Temple. The second book of Chronicles tells us that the destruction of the Temple was the resultant effect of the people's sinfulness. Not only did the people ignore the prophets that God sent to them, they actively derided them. The destruction of the Temple and the deportation of the people were the inevitable consequences of their infidelity to the covenant. But, through the graciousness of God, the process of rebuilding the Temple begins through the instrumentality of a foreign king. Today's first reading from the prophet Jeremiah promises a new covenant for the House of Israel, who because of their infidelities, had been chastened for a time. Whereas the old covenant had been written on stone tablets, the law of the new covenant will be written on the heart. The essence of this covenant is this: "I will be your God and you shall be my people."

Closely linked with the theme of Covenant is the theme of salvation of which the gospel readings, as mentioned earlier have orchestrated. During last Sunday's gospel, Jesus told Nicodemus that the Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert. Moses' lifting up of the bronze snake in the desert foreshadows the "lifting up" of Jesus on the Cross. Just as the bronze serpent was a life-giving antidote to the deadly venom of a snake, whoever "looks" at the Crucified Christ in faith receives something far beyond ordinary life; they receive a share in the eternal life of God. Humanity as a whole has been smitten with a deadly disease of sin. The lifting-up of Jesus on the Cross is our salvation. In today's gospel, Jesus tells us that his hour has come. He tells us that "unless a wheat grain falls into the earth and dies, it remains only a single grain; but if it dies it bears much fruit" (John 12:24). Therefore, salvation is about losing our life so that we will keep it for eternal life.

Recall that earlier in the gospel of John, John the Baptist identifies Jesus as the Lamb of God. (cf John 1:29ff). To understand what calling Jesus "the Lamb of God" means, we need to jump over to the Passion Narrative in Chapter 19. John's references to the Passover come to a climax in the passion narrative, where Jesus' crucifixion takes place on the day before the Passover. John tells us that it was the day of preparation. This was the day on which the Passover lambs were slaughtered, something that could be carried out only in the Temple. So, as thousands and thousands of lambs are being slaughtered in the Temple, Jesus dies on Golgotha, just outside the

walled city of Jerusalem. The book of Exodus tells us that the Jews were saved by the blood of the Passover lamb, sprinkled on their door posts. John is subtly telling us that we are saved by the blood of another Passover lamb, Jesus himself. But unlike the slaughter of the Paschal lambs in the Temple, a ritual repeated annually, the death of Jesus is the one, perfect sacrifice that never needs to be repeated. In the words of Pope Benedict XVI: "Jesus dies at the moment when the Passover lambs are being slaughtered in the Temple. Jesus dies as the real lamb, merely prefigured by those slain in the Temple."



As we approach the **Passion Week (Holy Week)**, the question that readily comes to mind is why would Jesus have to die in order to work our salvation? Jesus answers partially in today's gospel: He uses the image of a seed falling on the ground. The seed is Jesus himself, who by dying will give life to humanity. Just as a seed must die to its life as a single seed before it can yield an abundant harvest, **Jesus will bring life in abundance through his death on the Cross**. But then, you do not need to have an answer regarding why Jesus had to die, before the Cross can have its effects in your life. An English scholar, Tom Wright once theorized that you don't have to understand cooking before you can enjoy a good meal; neither do you have to understand the details of musical theories or acoustics to be moved by a wonderful violin solo. In the same way, you don't have to have a theory about why the Cross is so powerful before you can be moved and changed, before you can know yourself loved and forgiven, because of Jesus' death on the Cross. For us his followers he has asked us to do one thing and that is, to die before we die, so that when we die, we won't die.
