#### THE TWO PROCESSIONS TO JERUSALEM



Dear Friends in Christ.

Today begins our Holy Week when we commemorate the great events surrounding the arrests, torture, crucifixion and the death of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The gospel for the commemoration of the Lord's entrance into Jerusalem comes from the Gospel of St Mark. Also, the gospel for this Sunday is the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. This is the final week in the life of Jesus. It begins with Jesus approaching Jerusalem on the day that we traditionally call Palm Sunday, and it concludes with his resurrection from the dead on Easter Sunday. In year B of the liturgical cycle we listen to Mark's account of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, as well as Mark's account of the Lord's Passion. Recall that there are sixteen chapters in Mark's gospel. And six of those sixteen chapters are devoted to what Jesus did and said during his final week in Jerusalem. So, almost 40 per cent of Mark's gospel is devoted to a day-by-day account of this final week in the life of Jesus. Mark has gone out of his way to indicate the transition from one day to the next, thereby offering us a daily meditation for each day of the Holy Week. According to Mark's chronology Jesus enters Jerusalem on the day that we now call Palm Sunday and in company of his disciple, Jesus goes to the Temple, and afterwards he and the Twelve retire to Bethany for the night. The distance from Jerusalem to Bethany is approximately 1.5 miles. On Monday Jesus and the disciples leave Bethany and return to Jerusalem. They again leave the city in the evening. On Tuesday morning they return to Jerusalem once more. Mark indicates that it's now Wednesday by telling us that "it was two days before the Passover" when the chief priests and the scribes were now out to arrest him and have him put to death (cf The Passion narrative, Year B). Holy Thursday is the first day of the Unleavened bread. That evening, following a final meal with his disciples, Jesus is arrested. The following morning is the day that we traditionally call Good Friday, the day on which Jesus is crucified. The Sabbath is Holy Saturday. Jesus has been taken down from the Cross and laid in the tomb. Easter Sunday, the day of resurrection, is the first day of the week.

The tempo of Mark's narration slows down as we enter this final week. Before now, Mark gives a sense of urgency and immediacy to the actions of Jesus because "the Kingdom of God is at hand". But the tempo slows down during this final week, and the story unfolds day-by-day. Then on Friday the tempo slows further down to an hour-by-hour account: Morning - mid-morning - noon - mid-afternoon, and evening. Because the whole of Mark's narrative moves towards Jerusalem, and towards his death and resurrection, the gradual slowing down of the tempo intensifies the events of the crucifixion.

The Passover feast was one of the three pilgrimage festivals each year, and Jerusalem was usually crowded with pilgrims from far and near. The estimated population, at the pilgrimage festivals was somewhere around 500,000, especially for the feast of Passover. With such large crowd parading the streets around the Holy City, the Roman authorities were on high alert. Jesus entered Jerusalem on the Sunday before Passover, greeted by enthusiastic crowds. Coming from Bethany Jesus entered the city from the East. But this was not the only procession to enter Jerusalem at this time. On the opposite side of the city, from the west, Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor of Judea, also entered Jerusalem as the head of government escorted by a column of cavalry and foot soldiers.

Pilate normally resided, not in Jerusalem, but in Caesarea Maritima, that is, Caesarea-on-the-Sea, which is over 59 miles to the north-west of Jerusalem. Roman governors found life in Caesarea Maritima far more pleasant than Jerusalem, which was inland and insular, provincial and partisan, and often hostile. But for the major Jewish festivals, with so many pilgrims in the city, Pilate, like his predecessors, travelled to Jerusalem. So, we have two processions entering Jerusalem. Pilate's military procession was a demonstration of Roman imperial power. During the festival of Passover these troops reinforced the Roman garrison permanently stationed at Pilate's judgement courtyard overlooking the Jewish temple Mount and its courts. Imagine the Roman soldiers marching into the city with cavalry and stern-looking foot soldiers holding their armour, helmets, weapons, banners, and the standard bearer holding aloft a golden eagle, with the sounds of martial music and feet pounding the ground in unison, amidst the neighing of horses. Their message was crystal-clear: don't mess with us! Meanwhile, from the eastern side, Jesus rides on a lowly donkey, proclaiming the kingdom of God. From the west, Roman soldiers enter the city, proclaiming the power and grandeur of Rome. The crowd welcomes Jesus with palms, a symbol of Maccabean nationalism. They're hoping that Jesus is the one they have been waiting for - a new David, another Maccabean warrior. Here, they hoped, is the one who will overthrow the might of imperial Rome. But Jesus was the direct opposite of the great kings of the world. Indeed, Jesus is bringing the kingdom of God, and he has made it clear that this kingdom will be established by means of rejection, death, and resurrection in the city of David.



Jesus is indeed the true king, but not the king expected by the crowds who welcomed him into Jerusalem with palm branches and a royal acclamation. He is a king whose rule does not depend on political and military might. **Jesus will truly set his people free**. But not freedom from foreign invaders, like the Maccabees had achieved over a century earlier. Jesus will win a far greater victory than the Maccabees, and a victory over a far more powerful and insidious foe, but it will not be a

victory won by military might. On the Friday of this week Jesus will be lifted up on the cross. His victorious death on the cross will set us free **from the powers of sin and death**. Through the cross the gates of the Kingdom will be opened. Remember, there are two processions entering Jerusalem today. Which of the two are you joining?
